My primary care doctor is not much older than me. He is re ring at the end of the year. I recently read that more than half of internal medicine physicians are unhappy in their job.

Many are scaling back their practices or leaving medicine altogether. How did we get here? The e ology is likely multifactorial and seems deeper than just post-pandemic fatigue.

Some of the causes are the powerful currents that are transforming physicians into providers, pa ents into users of services, and the sacred doctor-patient relationship into a product called Healthcare. Neither internal medicine physicians nor pa ents are happy about it. Wellness modules, Doctor's Day trinkets and cosmetic changes are not addressing the underlying root structural problems.

I am an academic infectious diseases physician and the majority of my me is spent in direct patient care of fragile transplant and oncology pa ents. In this work I have witnessed lifesaving advances in medicine and also the churn that is wearing people down. As a patient and a father and husband, I have experienced amazing, life changing doctor/patient interactions but also the dehumanizing power of the medical industrial complex. Physicians, especially those in the cognitive special es, are increasingly considering leaving medicine altogether if they could. People are losing trust.

The ACP can stand as a bulwark against this. We are about excellence and professionalism. At the DC Chapter we ARE doing something about this. In the past year, our members have mentored countless younger learners, recognized outstanding colleagues with chapter and national awards, volunteered to help feed neighbors going through a rough stretch, and worked to change health policy at local and national levels.


I have hope for our field. The public s II largely trusts us, the younger people in medicine are amazing, and competition to get into medical school seems fiercer than ever. But it's going to take hard and persistent work to stem and reverse the trend toward devaluation of human physicians caring for human pa ents. We can do this and without outsourcing our values to the marketplace. Whether alone with a patient and their loved ones, or together as a group, we have a good deal of power to get things done. Let's keep at it.
